Register your disgust

Gravenstein Union School District Measure A has failed. That doesn't diminish the fact that the district held a rigged election to deliberately bypass the will of the electorate.

With just under a 42% turnout, it would have only taken 28% of the actual voters to win this election. Since only about half the eligible bothers to register, that means 14% of the eligible voters could have passed this tax measure.

That's why the district scheduled this tax measure at a special election rather than at a general election that would attract a much larger turnout. Then, in open defiance of our heritage (no taxation without representation) Measure A allowed seniors to opt out of paying the parcel tax.

This clear bribery was shameful. Their defiance of our heritage was arrogant. A special election for a tax measure is intolerable. Take a minute to register your disgust with the district. Better yet, take two minutes and send a tea bag.

The Missouri Information Analysis Center (MIAC) was established in 2005 to gather intelligence to help law enforcement combat terrorism. Part of that effort targets teaching law enforcement how to recognize potential members of domestic terrorist organizations - militias.

Demographics

The three Sonoma County cities with the highest density of registered Libertarians are: Healdsburg, Windsor, and Sebastopol. The cities with the greatest concentration of nearby Libertarians are: Sebastopol, Sonoma, and Windsor.

Possibly the most effective outreach material is most any of P.J. O'Rourke's humorous books. They effectively use humor to drive home the point that people seem to do best when free, and that the source of most problems is government intervention.

Parliament of Whores (1992), *Give War a Chance* (1992), *All the Trouble in the World* (1994), *Eat the Rich* (1998) and *On the Wealth of Nations*

(2007) are just a few of his efforts. His humor keeps you reading, allowing time for his pro-freedom message to take hold.

On the other hand, what interested citizen could resist reading Frederic Bastiat's slim (75 pages) and inexpensive booklet, *The Law*?

Many Libertarians came through the forge of Ayn Rand's *Atlas Shrugged*, which is now very dated in its depiction of technology. Would *Capitalism the Unknown Ideal* be a better introduction? What of *The Incredible Bread Machine*, *Free to Choose*, or *Economics in One Lesson*? What is the best book for Libertarian outreach?

Keep your powder dry

The time to organize is now. Who would you call – make a list. Who would you write to or send a flyer – make a list. Have stamps and envelopes on hand. Ten minutes of effective political action is easy if you are prepared.

Q: What's a "letter of Marque"?

A: From Wikipedia, "a letter of marque is an official warrant or commission from a government authorizing the designated agent to search, seize, or destroy speci-

fied assets or personnel belonging to a foreign party." Typically this is used to authorize privateers to raid enemy merchant ships.

Q: What's a "Bill of attainder"?

A: It is a legislative act or law which punishes an individual or group, bypassing the niceties of a trial.

Q: Why was the Twentieth Amendment passed?

A: Although faced with agitation to regulate alcohol, the federal government had no authority to act. Amendment XX gave that authority to the federal government which quickly passed legislation to control alcohol. Ninety years ago our Constitution still had meaning.

Handle guns like students?

Sharon Harris of Advocates for Self-Government has a wonderful blog discussing how gun owners would react to a proposal to have the government store our guns during the day.

Professionals would look after our firearms, cleaning, adjusting, and tinkering as they thought best. To make this service convenient, the government would send trucks to our homes twice a day to pick up and return our valuable weapons.

If we were dissatisfied with their efforts, particularly the tinkering, we would be free to pay a private business to tend to our firearms during the day. Of course, we would bear the cost and receive no rebate from the government for not using their service.

This would be intolerable to gun owners, the same people who tolerate the government picking their children up every morning to clean, adjust, and tinker with their minds.

If we don't stop the government's cleaning, adjusting, and tinkering with the minds of our children, will we ever regain our freedom?

What about global warming?

By chance I stumbled upon "An Appeal to Reason, a Cool Look at Global Warming" by Nigel Lawson. This slim book directly confronts global warming hysteria in barely 106 pages. Nicely backed with 23 pages of

notes and a ten-page bibliography, this book is must-read.

The Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) attempts to predict the cost of global warming by examining five areas: water supply, food supply, health impacts, ecosystem impacts, and coastal impacts. Lawson then skips past the inflated claims of the hysterics and uses the IPCC conclusions to show how little there is to worry about in all five areas.

This eminently readable book is both likely to be read by the concerned while being inexpensive enough to lend out. Buy several copies and get busy.

How to get an outstanding liberal arts education for \$7,000

On LewRockwell.com I found a link to a commentary by Joe O'Donnell. He suggests using the Socratic Dialogue method while spending four to five years studying just seven books. Most of the \$7,000 cost is for tutors who are knowledgeable in the various subject areas, and who will use the Socratic method.

Here is O'Donnell's book list: *Complete Works of Shakespeare*, Bertrand Russell's *History of Western Philosophy*, Randall's *The Making of the Modern Mind*, Rothbard's *Man, Economy and State*, Courant and Robbins' *What is Mathematics*, Abelson's *Structure and Interpretation of Computer Programs*, and Feynman's *Lectures on Physics*.

O'Donnell admits there needs to be an eighth book on general world history. Any suggestions? I am enjoying H.G. Wells' *The Outline of History*, but it was last updated in 1949. It also suffers from being a two-volume work. An interesting alternative is *Babylon is Everywhere*, by Wolf Schneider, and first published in German in 1960. This unique book looks at world history by examining the history of cities.
