A: *According to economist and author Mark Skousen, "Economics is the study of how individuals transform natural resources into final products and services that people can use."*

How do I get Liberty-smart?

Read, and read seriously. Jo Jorgensen, the 1996 Libertarian Vice-Presidential candidate came up with a method that suited her well. She scheduled and logged one hour of reading every night. She read with pen in hand and made marginal notes. Afterwards, she went back to her notes and used them to create index-card sized flashcards to help her study and learn.

It is one thing to read a book or magazine article that bolsters our confidence in libertarianism, and a very different thing to be able to discuss and defend the libertarian point of view. That takes serious reading, serious notes, and serious review.

You will spend untold hours reading facts and logic that support the libertarian viewpoint. Most of that time and effort (not

to mention money) will be wasted. That waste can be converted to gold if you will read more seriously, create your index cards and review them as necessary.

Fundamentals

More than a decade ago Harry Browne suggested concentrating on gaining converts as opposed to winning arguments. Since most people want to use government to achieve good results (seemingly), we need not attack their goals (very personal); instead, we simply show that using government leads to bad results.

Browne offered nine principles to counter the using government method. (1) Government failure – it hardly ever works, let alone works well. Just mention a few specific examples and suggest that there are better ways to do good work.

(2) Separate your wishes about government from the reality of how government works. Farm subsidies to keep food prices high come from the same source as the food stamps to keep food prices low.

(3) Using government makes any problem a political problem. Will sham hearings and payoffs to the politically connected really assist in solving the problem at hand?

(4) How does taking from the poor help? Sales taxes directly hurt the poor. Business taxes indirectly hurt the poor as businesses raise their prices to compensate. Regulations force prices up. Income taxes reduce paychecks and cause demands for higher wages. Higher wages are followed by higher prices, which hurt the poor the most.

(5) Where will it end? The income tax started with a 1% tax on incomes of more than \$8,000,000 (adjusted for inflation). Today, a single person pays a minimum 10% tax income that exceeds \$9,350. The minimum tax is ten times higher on an income 800 times smaller. The minimum tax is now 8,000 times more than it was in 1916. You may have a great idea, but where will it end?

(6) Beat this offer: Wouldn't you give up all the federal programs you like in exchange for never having to pay income taxes again?

(7) Will yet another unconstitutional program, trampling the rights of others, give you any assurance that your rights will be protected?

(8) Is this the lesson you really want to teach your children? Is using a gun to get what you want the lesson you want your children to learn and take to heart?

(9) Really? In the face of a corrupt and bankrupt government pushing trillions of dollars of debt off onto your children and grand-children, and you think we have time to waste implementing yet another government program guaranteed to fail?

Who killed GM?

Any large corporation will make lots of mistakes. General Motors (GM) has made a lot of mistakes. Still, it wasn't the mistakes that killed GM; it was simply that they played the game.

Decades before GM there was anti-trust. Our government decided that it was okay to attack, punish, and dismantle corporations simply because they were successful. Any American car company that reached the top of the heap would likely fall victim to anti-trust, but other factors also assisted in this crime.

Strikes are devastatingly expensive to companies with large fixed costs. American automobile companies were increasingly victimized by union strikers that effectively had government on their side. Non-union workers were driven away with open aggression and violence. Factories were occupied and forced into idleness, all with government acquiescence.

Union workers were appeased with excessive wage and benefit packages made affordable by anti-trust. With over 40% of the domestic market, GM had to find ways not to grow. Higher prices, declining quality, and stale designs all ensured GM would not be targeted by the government for being too successful.

The last straw was government imposed CAFE standards. GM had to build small, fuel-thrifty cars that weren't popular with the public. Prices had to be kept low on these unwanted cars in order to get enough of them sold to meet CAFE standards. Wisely, GM expanded its production of expensive truck-based vehicles (exempt from CAFE) in order to make a profit and fund union wages and benefits.

This tactic broke on the rocks of competition and sank in the face of high gas prices. GM was dead before it was born because that's what government does best.

The government game is simple: Heads they win and tails you lose.

Basic Economics (Part I)

Welcome to Part I of a four-part introduction to economics. If you’ve been putting off writing that letter to your local paper, or have been shy about discussing economics, then take this free mini-course in economics.

The first lesson in economics is simply that for any economic activity there is an **opportunity cost**. This isn’t a monetary cost, rather, it is the next most important thing we could have done with the resources consumed by our first choice.

For example, one person takes a bicycle ride. Her opportunity cost is an almost equally enjoyable swim. Another person goes to the movies, giving up a softball game. To do one thing means we give up doing something else. We can’t escape the opportunity cost of our economic decisions.

This reality also holds true for government. Anytime government uses resources to do one thing, it can’t do some other thing with those resources. If the government decides to save lives that would otherwise be lost to HIV, then those resources can’t be used to save lives from malaria.

Sadly, our legislators all seem to take the same Cuban mail-order economics course, where opportunity cost means: never waste the opportunity to spend money or it will cost you the election.

Future installments will cover rational decision making, why incentives matter, and the importance of marginal analysis.
